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AHIF Expands Its Bright Ideas TBI Camp Model

AHIF was pleased to provide three Bright Ideas TBI Camps in Summer 2019, partnering with Samford University, The University of Alabama, and the University of South Alabama.

More than 80 campers and caregivers total attended these camps. The camps were developed for survivors who are 3+ years removed from their injury to allow students in a variety of academic fields to work with our clients and caregivers to identify new ideas, exercises, services or strategies to continue adjusting to life following a traumatic brain injury.

Students from physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, social work, kinesiology, audiology, art therapy, music therapy, nursing and nutrition took part in the multi-day camps.

The University of Alabama Bright Ideas TBI Camp was held June 11-13, 2019, and introduced art, music and speech therapy to camp attendees. Four UA students in nutrition discussed individualized nutrition plans with clients and caregivers. Each day, campers also took a bus to the UA Adapted Athletics facility to engage in strength conditioning as well as flexibility and relaxation through an area yoga instructor.

The camp itself was held each day in the beautiful Capstone College of Nursing Building. In addition to the therapy, exercise and nutrition, lunch speaker Dr. Rachael Mumbower discussed methods for improving the sleep habits of TBI survivors and Johns Hopkins University nursing researcher Dr. Tamar Rodney spoke about trauma-informed care

for survivors of TBI.

I once read a quote where someone said "I will not allow yesterday's success to lull me into today's complacency, for this is the great foundation of failure." Every day AHIF encounters TBI survivors and their caregivers, and hear of their continued fight and drive to continue recovering from their injury. It serves as a continued reminder, each and every day, that these brave survivors and committed caregivers deserve our best each and every day, and our commitment to never settle and say "we have done all that we can do," because we can always strive to do more. Five years ago, when I came to AHIF, we were financially only able to offer one recreational weekend camp to our clients. In 2018, we expanded that back to the weeklong format from the past, and added our first Bright Ideas TBI Therapy Camp at Samford University. In 2019, we added two additional Bright Ideas Camps, and now in 2020 we are looking at a week-long and two weekend recreational camps, and six Bright Ideas TBI Camps. We have grown the number of Recreational Support Groups to 15, and have recently introduced a pilot program of Mental Health Counseling vouchers. It is indeed an exciting time for AHIF and our programs and services, and we are deeply thankful to those whose support has made this expansion possible, but also want our clients and caregivers to know that we are NOT done growing our programs, and look forward to continuing to offer more opportunities for growth and recovery to our clients and caregivers across the state. "Alexa, please remind me to share this TBI success story"

AHIF was pleased to welcome TBI survivor Darrius, along with his girlfriend and mother, to our Samford Bright Ideas TBI Camp this summer. While at camp, one of the challenges Darrius identified was trying to remember things he wanted to do throughout the day.

Community partners made it possible to provide each camp attendee with an Amazon Fire Tablet as part of attending camp, and one of the Speech Therapy students had the idea that an Amazon Echo Dot could actually help serve to help Darrius remember his daily "to-do" list.

AHIF took advantage of Amazon Prime Day and purchased an Echo Dot for \$24.99 just four days after camp was over. About a week and a half later, AHIF staff and the Samford student were able to hand deliver the Echo Dot to Darrius in his home, and get Alexa set up to provide daily reminders to keep him on schedule.

AHIF was also able to purchase and deliver a set of bedrails to another AHIF client who is now able to roll herself over and rely less on her caregiver for this small, but

so very important, daily activity.


