Alabama TBI Survivor has a "Crowning" achievement





AHIF Introduces a New TBI Identification Card in Brain Injury Awareness Month

So often, TBI survivors share with AHIF staff the difficulties of explaining to others what it is like to live with a TBI. This is especially true with first responders, including law enforcement. Often, effects of a TBI can cause suspicion that the individual might be under the influence or noncompliant to instructions, which can lead to escalation of a situation. As part of March and Brain Injury Awareness Month, AHIF introduced a new TBI ID card that it will offer all clients for free, allowing them to personalize a list of items unique to them as a result of their TBI, promoting understanding for those they might encounter. When AHIF initiated its mental health counseling program in 2019, we knew that demand for this service would continue to grow as more and more learned about its availability. As demand continued to grow from both clients and caregivers, AHIF assigned caseloads to certified AHIF staff members Chandraia Whitted, Bethany Leonard and Jenn O'Dell. But, AHIF was also fortunate to bring on Miguel Torres as a counseling intern from the University of Montevallo. Miguel has a special interest in family and group counseling, and is also a military veteran.
